Garden Volunteer Taster Day

Pentillie Garden History:

Pentillie's gardens were originally laid out in the late 17th century when Sir James Tillie built his house in a prominent position above the Tamar Estuary. The walls at the top of the American Gardens are thought to be some of the earliest walls built to separate a 'garden' area from the surrounding countryside.

The gardens also came to the fore in 1810, when Humphry Repton was given free reign to cast his designs across the surrounding landscape. Much of the ground was planted with trees, and hedges removed, to create his vision of landscape perfection. Lewis Kennedy's designs for the American Gardens followed shortly thereafter and eventually led to many 'American' plants being imported into this area to create areas of great interest and beauty.

Over time, much of the finesse of Pentillie's gardens has been lost to rampaging laurel due to reduced gardener numbers following the World Wars of the 20th century, and to a reduced interest in the 55 acres of woodland garden.

When the current Coryton family inherited Pentillie in 2007, they also inherited a tax bill of nearly £5m, meaning that their financial focus was on the house rather than the gardens. Therefore, head gardener Chris Duke was left alone to manage the wilderness as best he could. He retired as Covid-19 hit in 2020, and so the plan to recruit his replacement was put on hold until now.

So, while we have our eyes peeled for the 'right' new senior gardener, we also have a great team in place, who are working to develop a longer-term strategy for the garden alongside a new garden volunteer programme.

The Garden Volunteer Programme:

With 55 acres of woodland gardens and herbaceous borders, the list of jobs to do within the gardens is long to say the least! Following the recent return of Sue Bryant, who has many years of experience looking after volunteers and teaching young adults in gardens, we thought it was time we looked at starting a volunteer programme in the gardens here at Pentillie.

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Volunteers will be invited to assist in the maintenance and development of the Pentillie gardens through various planned tasks and activities. Achievements will be notable through the development of new areas, and the presentation of the beds and visitor areas.

No previous gardening experience is required, but please bring your own gardening gloves and we will provide plenty of tea, coffee and biscuits.
